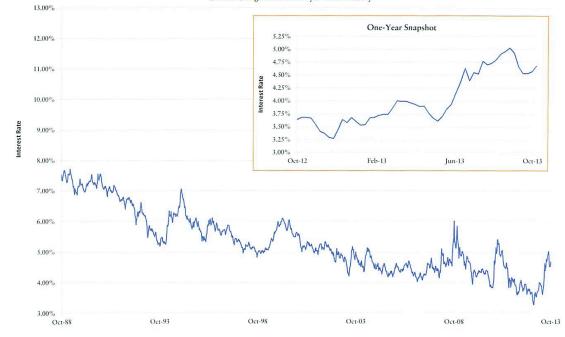

As the District continues to move forward with the planning, we can revisit these assumptions as needed. The tax rate projections are provided for planning purposes only and are subject to change.

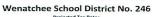

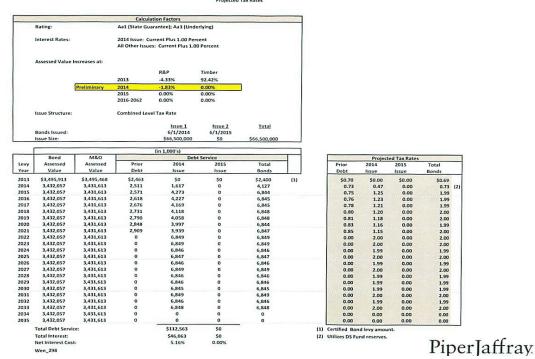

\$66.5 Million Bond - 0% Growth 2015 & Thereafter



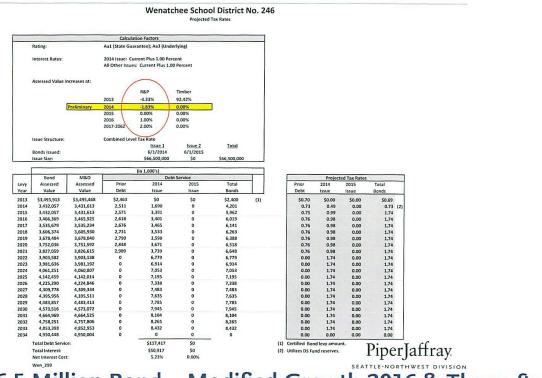

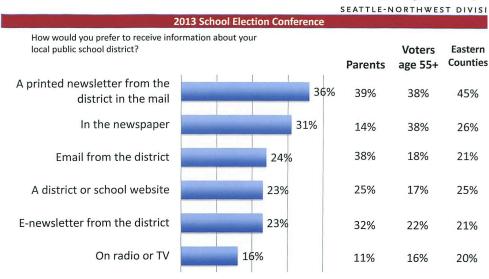

School Nurse Scope of Practice:

- New Legislation July 2013
 Engrossed Senate Bill (ESB) 5104 regarding the use of epinephrine injectors in schools. Schools <u>may</u> have a stock supply of injectors "to respond to an anaphylactic reaction under a standing protocol according to RCW 28A.210.300."
- Would allow:
 - 1. Trained school staff could give to students with medication orders and guided treatment plan.
 - 2. School Nurse could give to student without medication or treatment plan in place (1st time Anaphylactic reaction) under standing protocol.

Stock Epinephine

Legislature wants to expand that to unlicensed staff next year.

"The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall review the anaphylaxis policy guidelines required under RCW 28A.210.380 and make a recommendation to the education committees of the legislature by December 1, 2013, based on student safety, regarding whether to designate other trained school employees to administer epinephrine auto injectors to students without prescriptions for epinephrine auto injectors, demonstrating the symptoms of anaphylaxis when a school nurse is not in the vicinity."

New additional Nasal Spray

• CHAPTER 180 [Substitute House Bill 1541]

- This is an addition to existing medication policy to allow for nasal sprays to be given in schools, specifically to address students with seizure disorders that may need nasal Valium or Versed to stop a seizure. We are waiting for guidance from Nursing Commission, OSPI and Attorney General at this point. As law is written only RN/parent/parent designated advocate can give legend drug via nasal spray at school.
- Diastat (Rectal Valium)- Nursing Commission issued an advisory statement that delegating rectal medications is not within the scope of practice for Registered Nurses practicing in the school setting.

Diabetic Student Management

How much self-care are they capable of? Every Diabetic student is different.

- Can student check his or her own blood sugar?
- Is student using a vial/syringe, insulin pen or an insulin pump?
- Can student self-inject insulin using insulin pen? With or without adult supervision?
- Can student deliver insulin bolus using pump independently or with supervision?
- Can student carbohydrate count independently?
- Will parent be sending a carbohydrate counted lunch or will student be having hot lunch? Who will carb count the lunch?
- Will they eat entire lunch or a portion? Insulin before or after lunch?

How much supervision is required?

Student has no self care ability-

Nurse/Parent/PDA must provide care. Unlicensed staff must be aware of Hypo/ Hyperglycemia and treatment.

- Student able to test blood sugar, but unable to self inject insulin-Nurse/Parent/PDA must administer all insulin.
- Student able to self inject insulin using an insulin pen-Trained, designated school staff can verify that number of insulin units has been correctly "dialed" per the student. Insulin amount determined by pre-lunch blood glucose, lunch carbs, and doctor order.
- Student has a pump-

Trained, designated staff can verify that student entered correct number of lunch carbs into pump and that student delivered dose.

Parent Designated Advocate

- **RCW 28A.210.330** The statute defines a Parent-Designated Adult (PDA) as "a volunteer, who may be a school employee, who receives additional training from a healthcare professional or expert in diabetes care selected by the parents, and who provides care for the child consistent with the individual health plan." Parents, rather than the school, are responsible for the training of the PDA.
- PDA provides care that the Nurse can not legally delegate in the school setting, such as giving an injection.
- Can be a school employee- must be voluntary, they can not be compensated for it, employee must file statement with HR stating their willingness to accept responsibility.

- Student checks blood sugar
- Glucometer communicates with pump.
- Student enters number of lunch carbs and pump determines amount of insulin delivered.
- Trained staff verify student entered the correct number of carbs.

Much discussion took place during the presentation. The board asked questions and the nurses all participated in helping to answer their questions. It was pointed out that our district has a ratio of 1 nurse to 2100 students. OSPI recommended ratio is 1 nurse to 750-1500 students. The office managers and secretaries are the nurses back up in the buildings but not allowed to administer some of the meds and procedures. There is concern about immunization follow-through in the district; the board would like to see that checked into. 2) Career Readiness Pilot Grant:

Susan Adams, Skill Source, & Dennis Conger, CTC Director & Diana Haglund, Wenatchee Learns Co-coordinator presented the following information to the board. Career Readiness For a Working Washington **Pilot Presentation**

Call to Action: The Employment Security Department (ESD), the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI), local Workforce Development Councils (WDCs), are looking to develop a systemic approach to integrate comprehensive career awareness, career exploration and career readiness as an expected part of a students learning experience. Wenatchee was among five WDCs select to develop pilots that could be replicated across the state. The expected outcome of funding the pilots is an increase in higher graduation rates and higher youth employment rates.

Implementation: The pilot will start with a beta test group at WestSide High School (WSHS) and SkillSource Learning Center. This small manageable group includes significant population WIA eligible students. As tools are developed to meet the broad goals of the pilot at WSHS and SkillSource we will also be in conversation with Wenatchee High School Administration to deign an implementation process.

Exhibit A - Monthly Enrollments.

The **October 2013** count of K-12 students is **7,829,63 full-time equivalents** (FTE) including 126.14 FTE Running Start students (Running Start students are counted starting in October).

The *average* FTE is **7,755.36** which are **50.36** FTE above budgeted *average* FTE of 7,705.

The K-12 count includes BEA, ALE and Dropout Reengagement FTE.

Exhibit B shows the changes in our average FTE enrollment, as reported to SPI, over time. Exhibit B reflects the history of our actual state funding level of FTE.

Exhibit C is a restatement of enrollment from 2001-02 for comparability.

Kindergarten is restated based on headcount rather than FTE due to the state funding formula changes. All day kindergarten at Columbia has been BEA funded since 2007-08. All day kindergarten at Lewis & Clark, Lincoln, and Mission View has been BEA funded since 2008-09. Newbery Elementary is newly funded for 2013-14.

The current Wenatchee Valley Technical Skills Center counts for grades 9-12 have been included in years prior to 09-10 for comparability. As a branch campus, Moses Lake enrollment is excluded from Wenatchee's count.

Exhibit D shows the monthly information in graphic form, with a comparison to last year's (2012-13) actual enrollment and 2013-14 budgeted numbers.

Bond Counsel Engagement Letter for the Issuance of Unlimited Tax General Re: **Obligation Bonds**

Honorable Board of Directors:

We greatly appreciate the opportunity to be of continuing service as bond counsel to Wenatchee School District No. 246, Chelan County, Washington (the "District"). The purpose of this engagement letter is to set forth certain matters concerning the services we will perform as bond counsel to the District in connection with the issuance of the above-referenced bonds (the "Bonds"). RCW 28A.330.100 authorizes the Board of Directors of the District (the "Board") to employ attorneys and to prescribe their duties and fix their compensation. We understand that the Bonds will be issued to finance costs of remodeling and expanding Lincoln Elementary School, the Bonds will be issued to innance costs of remodeling and expanding Lincoin Elementary School, constructing and equipping a new Washington Elementary School, remodeling Special Education/Early Childhood Learning Center, making safety improvements and remodeling gymnasium at Pioneer Middle School and making safety improvements at Mission View Elementary School. We also understand that the District may sell the Bonds in multiple series over several years and that each series of the Bonds will likely be sold to Piper Jaffray & Co. (the "Purchaser"), through negotiated sales.

SCOPE OF ENGAGEMENT

In this engagement, we will perform the following duties as bond counsel for each series of Bonds issued: (1) subject to the completion of proceedings to our satisfaction, render our legal opinion (the "Bond Opinion") regarding the validity and binding effect of the Bonds, the source op and the Bond's provide optimite of the Bond's, and the excludability of interest on the Bond's, the source of payment and security for the Bond's, and the excludability of interest on the Bond's from gross income for federal income tax purposes; (2) prepare and review documents necessary or appropriate to the authorization, issuance and delivery of the Bond's, and coordinate the authorization and execution of such documents; (3) review legal issues relating to the structure of the Bond's; and (4) review the section of the official statement, private placement memorandum or other form of offering or disclosure document to be disseminated in connection with the sale of the Bond's involving the federal income tay treatment of interest on the Bond's of the Bonds involving the federal income tax treatment of interest on the Bonds.

Our Bond Opinion will be addressed to the District and will be delivered by us on the date each series of the Bonds are exchanged for their purchase price (the "Closing"). The Bond Opinion will be based on facts and law existing as of its date. In rendering our Bond Opinion, we will rely upon the certified proceedings and other certifications of public officials and other

During the course of this engagement, we will rely on the District to provide us with complete and timely information on all developments pertaining to any aspect of each series of Bonds and their security. We understand that officials and employees of the District will cooperate with us in this regard.

ATTORNEY-CLIENT RELATIONSHIP

Upon execution of this engagement letter, the District will be our client and an attorneyclient relationship will exist between us. In this transaction we represent only the District, we are not counsel to any other party, and we are not acting as an intermediary among the parties. Our services as bond counsel regarding the Bonds are limited to those contracted for in this letter. The District's execution of this engagement letter will constitute an acknowledgment of those limitations. Our representation of the District regarding the Bonds will be concluded upon issuance of the final series of Bonds. Nevertheless, subsequent to each Closing, we will mail the appropriate Internal Revenue Service Form 8038, and prepare and distribute to the participants in the transaction a transcript of the proceedings pertaining to each series of the Bonds.

CONFLICTS

Foster Pepper PLLC ("Foster Pepper") represents many political subdivisions, companies and individuals. It is possible that during the time that we are representing the District, one or more of our present or future clients will have transactions with the District. It is also possible that we may be asked to represent, in an *unrelated* matter, one or more of those types of clients. For example, from time to time we serve as counsel to bond underwriters or purchasers (in fact, we have previously served as underwriter's counsel to the Purchaser, but, as of the date hereof, we have no active matters representing the Purchaser), or we represent neighboring governments, or we assist developers in land use or environmental matters. To the extent we believe such future representation may adversely affect our representation of the District, we will disclose such representation to the District and, if required by ethical rules, seek the appropriate District consent. However, the District's consent to our representation of other clients as described in this paragraph does not extend to our firm's lawyers representing a client in any litigation or similar dispute adverse to the District before any court or similar forum. A separate waiver would need to be sought, based on the facts of the relevant dispute.

Based upon: (1) our current understanding of the terms, structure, size and schedule of the financing represented by the Bonds; (2) the duties we will undertake pursuant to this engagement letter; (3) the time we anticipate devoting to the financing; and (4) the responsibilities we will assume in connection therewith, our fees (including out-of-pocket costs) will be determined according to the following schedule for each series of the Bonds issued:

Our fees described in the foregoing fee schedule may increase if: (1) material changes in the structure, size or schedule of the financing occur (*e.g.*, the addition of a refunding or defeasance component to any series of the Bonds or issuance of any series of the Bonds as tax credit bonds); (2) the ballot proposition for the Bonds must be submitted at multiple elections before it is approved; or (3) unusual or unforeseen circumstances arise that require a significant increase in our time or responsibility. If, at any time, we believe that circumstances require an adjustment of the foregoing fee schedule, we will advise you in writing. Our fees will be paid at the time of Closing of each series of the Bonds. The Board hereby authorizes the Purchaser to deduct our fee from the price paid to the Donos. The board hereby authorizes the runchaser to deduct our fee from the price paid to the District for each series of the Bonds and to pay the fee directly to us via wire transfer. The Board consents to payment of our fee in this manner. *Payment of our fee is contingent on a successful election and Closing of each series of the Bonds.* If for any reason, however, the financing represented by each series of the Bonds is completed without the delivery of our Bond Opinion as bond counsel, or our services are otherwise terminated, we will expect to be compensated at our normal hourly rates for time actually spent on your behalf; provided that, (1) we submit a billing statement to the District that describes the time, legal services and expenses incurred on your behalf, and (2) such compensation shall not exceed the amount of the fee that would have been paid had the particular series of the Bonds closed with our Bond Opinion.

Upon request, papers and property furnished by you will be returned promptly. Our own files, including lawyer work product, pertaining to the transaction will be retained by us. For various reasons, including the minimization of unnecessary storage expenses, we reserve the right to dispose of any documents or other materials retained by us after the termination of this engagement.

If the foregoing terms are acceptable to the Board, please have two duplicate originals of this letter executed by the Secretary to the Board, and return one original to me. Please retain one executed original for the District's files. We look forward to working with you. Thank you.

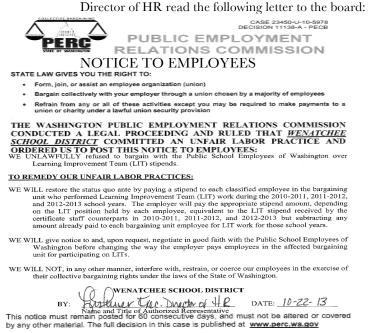
